

Lake Wabukayne Victim of Oil Spill

Lake Wabukayne in south Meadowvale has been contaminated in the past few months by someone dumping oil into the storm sewer.

The first occurrence was in October when a resident reported that the ducks in the lake were covered in oil and could not fly. Toronto Wildlife was called in to catch and treat the ducks before returning them safely. City and Region environment staff took immediate action to clean the oil from the lake and stop it from spreading.

Then in mid November, another oil spill was reported. This time it was heavy black grease that was dumped into the lake contaminating the area. Staff again contained the spill and hired an environmental firm to undertake the cleanup. Staff have identified a possible source and are taking steps to deal with it.

I want to thank the residents who took action and reported these spills and who helped save the wildlife. I want to remind everyone that Lakes Wabukayne and Aquitaine are storm water ponds and anything that is put into the storm sewer ends up in one of the lakes. It is illegal and dangerous to dump anything that might contaminate the ponds in the sewer. You could be fined up to \$10,000 for a first offence but the actual cost could be very high depending on the impact it causes.

Infrastructure Levy Proposed

As part of our budget review, Council has agreed to consider a special tax levy for 2008 that will be directed to infrastructure. The amount of the levy will be 5% of the City portion of the tax bill which is 28% of your total tax bill. The actual amount will vary depending on how much you pay in property taxes. For example, for a home with a \$3000 tax bill, the City portion is \$840. The infrastructure tax levy on that home would be 5% of \$840 or \$42.

This move is a result of the recent Federal government's mini-budget which gave no funding to municipalities for our infrastructure. Cities have also been hit with much downloading of costs from the province for many years now and we can only raise revenue through user fees and taxes.

New "Lisgar" GO Station opens in Ward 9

I had the pleasure of welcoming the first train to stop at Ward 9's new GO Station on September 4 at 6:32 a.m. - right on schedule. MPP Bob Delaney and I met all the trains and welcomed the first commuters. The new Lisgar GO Station, the first new GO station in Mississauga in 25 years, is at Tenth Line and Argentia and provides more transit choices for our residents.

Our community has waited a long time for this new station and it has been a priority of mine since I was first elected in 1991. It not only serves the northwest part of the City but is also designed to take commuters from west and north of Mississauga. It will help ease traffic on our east-west roads leading to the Meadowvale and Streetsville stations. The Lisgar GO Station is an integral

part of our transportation improvements for Mississauga and I am continuing to work with MPP Delaney to get all-day service. It is an example of how we can get results when levels of government work together towards a common goal for the benefit of our community.

Infrastructure Levy

As our city ages, our infrastructure such as bridges, roads, buildings etc. face high repair and replacement costs. We estimate that over the next 20 years our infrastructure deficit is \$1.5 billion and we need an extra \$75 million per year to eliminate this deficit. We have looked at various ways to deal with this and will be implementing some in the coming years such as using our reserves initially, and then debt financing in future years.

We have remained debt free and had no tax increases for over a decade. Even with this added tax, we will continue to have one of the lowest tax rates in the province. We wisely built reserves which we are now using but these only go so far. The added levy will add \$12.75 million per year towards capital costs which is still short of the required \$75 million but it will allow us to proceed with needed projects that otherwise would have to be deferred. In Ward 9 some of the major projects that could be impacted are the Meadowvale Community Centre renovation, bridge, road and overpass repairs and an underpass at the CP Rail line on Tenth Line that I have asked to be added to the long range budget.

More information is available on the City web site at www.citiesnow.ca where you can also calculate your levy amount. This was a tough decision for Council to make but we felt it was unavoidable if we are to provide the level of service and safety our residents expect and deserve. I initially questioned the recommendation but ultimately supported it on the condition that the revenue is clearly spent on infrastructure needs only. **Council has only approved the levy in principle.** It will form part of our overall budget discussions in December and we will continue to work with other levels of government for funding.



The Dam Youth Drop-in is one of the most vital parts of the Ward 9 community. It is a community outreach program for all teens, but specifically targets youth who need a safe place to go and talk to someone. *The Dam* is a friend and resource for youth so they can stay home and in school while being a positive part of the community. Its goal is to prevent them from running away and becoming homeless street kids. Programming ranges from the drop-in to specialized programming that develops youth into leaders. The youth and young moms of *The Dam* are part of the community where we live, work and succeed together. We all have a role in helping our youth live and succeed.

Accessibility is for Everyone!

When we hear the term "accessibility", many people assume it is only for those who have specific physical limitations. In fact, the work that our Accessibility Advisory Committee is doing will be of benefit to all.

I have been on this committee since its inception and I am constantly impressed with the achievements of this group of citizens. They work diligently with me and Councillor Katie Mahoney and City staff.

Our AAC produced an Accessibility Design Handbook that is a leader in the province. They have also commented on and made suggestions for all new city projects and have worked with Mississauga Transit to get service improvements on our buses that will benefit all users.

Making our City fully accessible is the goal of Council and the AAC. As our population ages, our older adults will find these improvements beneficial as will parents with young children.

Council has moved forward with many improvements with the support of the AAC. The expansion of our online services enables residents, businesses and visitors to conduct business with the City from home. More than 74 per cent of our buses and 15 routes are accessible and, following on my suggestion some years ago, we have installed larger street name signs at signalized intersections to improve readability.

Being able to access all services and facilities is everyone's right and we are well on our way to making that a reality in Mississauga.

Eden Community Food Bank services the L5M and L5N postal codes. It is located in the basement of Eden United Church in Meadowvale and is an independent not for profit organization governed by a Board of Directors. It is driven

by over eighty volunteers who pick up donations, do fundraising, and give out food as well as providing advocacy to its clients.

In an average month, Eden serves 250 families comprising about 750 people and hands out 7,500 kilograms of food. Eden relies on donations of food and cash from individuals, service organizations and corporate partners. It is open three times a week: Monday afternoon 1-3 p.m., Monday evening 6-8 p.m. and Thursday evening 6-8:30 p.m.

Enhanced Pavement Marking

Last year, as a member of the Mississauga Safe Driving Committee, I worked on an Enhanced Pavement Marking pilot project. This was another tool we developed to deal with pedestrian safety and involved a combination of enhanced pavement marking treatments and techniques such as the Zebra Striping Crosswalks.

Higher visibility crosswalks are used to increase driver recognition of a crosswalk by painting the crosswalk with "zebra stripes". These enhanced markings clearly mark the intersection for pedestrians and make the crossing area more visible for motorists, providing additional pedestrian safety.

As part of the pilot project, three Ward 9 locations were selected in 2006. These included the intersections of Castlebridge Drive and Greensboro Drive, Tenth Line West and McDowell Drive and Long Valley Road and McDowell Drive. I got a lot of very positive feedback from the residents in these areas as well as from motorists. This led to the development of a regular program to review and implement enhanced pavement markings at suitable locations where there are a high number of pedestrians.

As part of this year's plan, the intersection of Winston Churchill Boulevard and Battleford Road, was added this fall. I would appreciate any feedback you may have on this road treatment as we continue to find ways to improve safety in our community.



I also felt that using this material on the posts would prevent the plastering of illegal signs all over the hazard signs which is dangerous.

Staff researched the reflective material and decided to test white instead of red and have installed the strips on these locations: Edenwood/Tours, Edenwood/Oka (westbound only), Plantation/Hazelton.

Planning Activity in Ward 9

There has been a lot less building activity in Ward 9 as the Meadowvale and Central Erin Mills communities have been almost built out for some time. We will still see some building in the Erin Mills Regional Centre lands east of Winston Churchill north of Eglinton. The high density site on Hazelton Place will be built in the future but most of the retail and commercial construction has been finished. The future phases of the Erin Meadows Seniors' residence will also take place at a future time and there is one public school site un-built on Duncairn Drive.

In the Meadowvale area, we are starting to see applications for intensification, or expansion of uses on an existing site. As usual I will work with the area residents as these applications come forward.

The Meadowvale Business Park continues to fill in. Development of the retail/commercial along Argentia continues and when Argentia is built through to Ninth Line, the lands in that area will be built out for industrial uses. Ward 9 continues to be a favoured location for major companies to locate and there are many job opportunities that come with these developments.

Traffic Signal Improvements

There have been a few traffic signal improvements done in the Ward this year. I had north and southbound left turn arrows installed at Winston Churchill and Erin Centre in response to requests and I already see a big improvement in traffic movement at this location.

The signals at Tenth Line West and Avalon Drive and the signals for our new GO station at Argentia and Tenth Line are now operating.

Along Winston Churchill, I am waiting for results of traffic studies for advanced signals at Crosscurrent and signalization at Tradewind and Danton Promenade. In the meantime, staff did some timing modifications at Crosscurrent.

Audible pedestrian signals are scheduled to be installed at the intersections of Eglinton/Glen Erin, Eglinton/Metcalf and Erin Mills/Eglinton and are scheduled to be operational by the middle of December.

Speed Watch Enhanced

You may have seen the City's Speed Watch trailer on our roads. I have them installed in neighbourhoods where we have speeding concerns and they do a good job of educating motorists to slow down. They are effective and I get good feedback when they are installed.

Last year, I made a proposal to Traffic Safety Council when I was a member to purchase one for each ward to be used in school zones. This year we purchased 11 "Speed Display Devices" for the new Neighbourhood Speed Awareness Program.

The primary objective of this program is to target residential roadways with school zones in effect (40 km/hr zones). The equipment will be rotated weekly so that all schools in the ward will have the program implemented. This will help us target a wider range of motorists and residents. A speed information device (SID) which is mounted to light standards or hydro poles displays the operating speed of approaching motorists. I am confident it will become a very popular educational and awareness tool as we work to keep our roads safe.

Eden Cemetery Study

As I have reported previously, the Region of Peel is undertaking a Class Environmental Assessment Study on Derry Road to see if the road should be widened to 6 lanes.

The proposed road widening of Derry Road would have a severe impact on Eden Cemetery, located at the south east corner of Derry Road and Shelter Bay. As part of the study, the consultant has indicated that this could include closing a portion of the cemetery and disinterring remains. As this cemetery remains active, closing of this cemetery would involve a lengthy process with current interment rights holders and the Cemeteries Regulations Branch.

It was necessary for the consultant to conduct an archaeological study this August on various areas outside the cemetery boundary. A small section of land was excavated by hand in close proximity to the Nathan Kindree marker located adjacent to the fence line boundary.

Unfortunately, this area has already been disturbed with underground utility lines and therefore, any positive identification of interments located in this area could not be verified. If there were to be any future construction in this area, it would be closely monitored for remains.

The consultant has yet to present their initial recommendations to Regional Council for our review. I have met with staff and the consultant and expressed my opposition to any proposal that would impact on the Eden Cemetery. Besides being an active cemetery, it is a vital part of our community's heritage and will not be touched.

In February, you can participate in a 2-day "Visioning Symposium" where residents, community groups, Council and City staff will work together to further develop the ideas into a deliverable and achievable plan.

At the end of the campaign, the results will be revealed when we present a draft strategic plan in 2008.

Going Green

Council has approved a number of "green" initiatives to help improve the environment.

Green Power: Green power at the Civic Centre begins as a one year pilot project this fall. This initiative will reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 4,400 tonnes or the equivalent of removing 975 cars from Mississauga roads.

Biodiesel Fuel: Council approved a B5 grade of biodiesel fuel into the bus fleet's fuel supply. It is expected to reduce the amount of greenhouse gases by about 1,800 tonnes annually.

Hybrid Vehicles: The City is continuing to purchase energy-efficient and hybrid-electric vehicles as part of its Green Fleet. Hybrid vehicles are used by Works, Inspections, Forestry, Animal Services, Parking Enforcement, Vehicle Licensing.

Renewable Energy Project: Solar photovoltaic panels are being installed on the Hershey Centre this fall. The solar panels will convert sunlight into electricity and will be able to generate 25 to 30 kilowatts of electricity which is the equivalent of the electricity required to light a typical fire station for one year. The electricity will be sold to the Ontario grid, generating approximately \$12,500 per year in revenue. The project is also expected to reduce carbon dioxide emissions by \$25,800 kilograms per year for approximately 25 years.

Recycling in our Parks: Five Ward 9 parks were part of a new pilot recycling program in 2007 which included recycling of glass, plastic bottles and cans in 41 major parks and sports field facilities. ●

Snow Clearing ❄️❄️

Snow clearing operations are generally within 24 hours after the end of a winter storm. Heavy snowfalls of more than 6" (15 cm) or back-to-back storms can extend snow clearing operations to 48 hours or more after the end of a winter storm.

- If snowfall is less than 3" (8 cm), major roads are salted, residential streets and priority sidewalks are sanded if required.
- If a snowfall is more than 3" (8 cm), major roads are plowed and then salted. Residential streets and priority sidewalks are plowed and sanded.
- Parked cars should be removed from the street
- Do not place snow on the roadway
- Priority sidewalks are located on major roads, bus routes and streets that access hospitals, schools and nursing homes.
- If you are not on a street that gets sidewalk clearing, please be a good neighbour and clear snow and ice from the sidewalk in front of your home as soon as possible
